As a team the players set three goals at the start of the season:

Three ticks. The coaching staff have pushed the players and they have really responded as the season progressed. We challenged the team that if we achieved these goals, we would have every chance of reaching the finals. Another tick. On these measures our season was a resounding success. Finals are a bonus and knockout sport is <u>a vastly different</u> beast with no second chances.

The game itself saw our best 40 minutes all year. I am so proud of the team for the effort they put in. They flew out of the blocks and took the game to Brighton. Our defense was frantic and fully committed right across the field and we thoroughly deserved the 19-5 lead at halftime thanks to storming forward tries from Zack and Jack.

Sadly, we just could not close the game out. Credit where it is due, our opposition weathered the storm and came out on top with the last play of the game.

<u>Let's</u> put this result in context though. Back in Round 4 when we played Brighton and took a flogging 61-12. In Round 13 we were robbed of a victory, falling agonizingly short 17-19. The improvement by the U12 team over the season is clearly seen in these results. The semi-final could have gone either way.

I would like to thank all the parents for their support of the team throughout the year; Mick, Ethan, <u>Eugene</u>, and Jannie for all their coaching work and support; and the players for putting up with us.

I have learnt a lot, had a great season, and hope the players have too. I can't wait for next season.

Well I am not sure if there is too much to say except you Blo..y beauty!!!

We are so proud of the team, and they truly deserve to be in the Grand Final this week. This year had seen a huge improvement against Onkas coming from a 65-5 loss to then a 22-20 loss where we coughed up a 10-point lead late in the game. The team as did the coaches new they had a real opportunity and can only imagine that Onkas also new we were a real threat! It was theirs to lose given they had only been beaten twice in the season by Brighton. Number 13 had been identified as the clear threat to OC campaign, and he truly showed us why with this run! To OC credit they soon bounced back and were again dominating play in the attacking quarter, with the ball being moved freely around the backline. Finally, the opportunity came for Wady to somehow weave his way through, to cross the line for a 40m try. The crowd did however hold its breath while Wady continued to weave closer to the goal posts once over the line to eventually get the ball down making Will's conversion that little bit easier 7-7 mid way through the first!

The continued pressure by OC was rattling the much larger Onkas team and you could see that they were starting to feel the pressure as continued and uncharacteristic mistakes were happening. These mistakes soon lead to Matty having the opportunity to score from his favourite number 12 position, taking the score to 14-7 at the half time break.

Words of encouragement and need to stay focused was the key messages at the half time beak, you could see the team had a spring in their step, but we had been in this position before with Onkas and needed to stay committed and maintain the pressure as we had been doing in the first half.

We played well that day but that was on the heavy, pace equalising turf of Lindoch oval. The hard, dry, open Elizabeth plains were a different kettle of fish though.

Some like to say that the Fijian game plan is all chaos and so no one knows what's going on, and then panic ensues. But that's not really true (well the panic part maybe). There's method there. A better word to describe it would be Kinetic - active, dynamic, energetic, fast. The real challenge is not to throw up your hands but rather figure out how to deal with the reality. The Rams were fully awake to the need accumulate points and had no hesitation to take 3 from a penalty with only 2 minutes played. We settled after that, to a degree, and were next to score courtesy of Louis Wauchope down the right wing, finished with a well struck conversion from Alex Rokobaro. The Rams were quick to respond. Premier Grade Elizabeth 43 V Old Collegians 28

The First Grade bowed out of the finals with a disappointing loss to Elizabeth in the elimination final. Whilst Old Colls had dominance of the set piece and scored five tries from some well-structured attacks, Elizabeth focused on disrupting the rucks and launching dangerous counter-attacks which netted them seven tries and they continue on to the next final against Burnside.

Old Colls started with a focus on limiting Elizabeth's possession of the ball, taking an early opportunity for Ormsby to take a penalty kick for the first three points of the game. Pressure on the Elizabeth lineout forced them back into their 22 and Lane stole a ruck turnover on the left side, with Merrin going quickly blind down the left wing then popping inside to Bartlett for a try in the corner.

Elizabeth took advantage of a couple of errors from Old Colls and turned around to show glimpses of their potential down the wings, just being clipped with diving tackles from McDonough, Coetzer and Howlett. A dropped ball near the 22 gave Elizabeth an attacking opportuning to launch phases from a scrum, driving over the line to get on the board 20 minutes in. A deep restart was returned with interest to get back into the 22, with Elizabeth taking a quick tap from a ruck penalty then finding space in the right corner for a converted try and the lead.

The forwards pulled back the momentum with a tighthead scrum on halfway, allowing the backs to move play into the 22 where Bartlett was held up over the tryline. Ormsby kicked a penalty back into the 22 and the forwards won another scrum 10m out on the left of the posts, with Merrin cutting wide right to Coetzer who occupied two defenders and slipped a pass back inside to Litchfield for a try and a 1 point lead with 2 minutes left. Unfortunately Old Colls let Elizabeth turn them over off the restart, which they exploited with a quick offload and try to take a 19-13 lead at the break.

Old Colls pressured themselves with several dropped balls in contact pushing play into the defensive 22 for the first 15 minutes. The defence held for a while but the force of possession was telling and ultimately Elizabeth was able to put together enough phases to create space out wide left for a try. They punished again slipping two tackles from the restart to escape down the left wing for a 60m try, though McDonough reignited the fight by charging down the conversion attempt.

A penalty on the restart finally gave Old Colls some possession and McKinley kicked play into the 22. The forwards won a scrum penalty 10m out on the left wing, with the backs going quickly to the right where Litchfield was just held short, then McKinley scored in the right corner. Howlett's lineout set an attack from another penalty in the 22, as phase play took Jeshua and Perdana close to the line, then Ormsby cut back to Howlett for a dive around the winger and five points to reduce the deficit to 8.

Elizabeth restarted deep and Old Colls kept ball in hand to run out, working phases into the attacking 22 but ultimately being aggressively stripped of the ball and Elizabeth countered with an 80m breakaway score. They then sealed it with a deft chip and regather on the restart to get behind the defence, then slipping through for a final try. McDonough leapt high to pull in a short restart, setting up a final chance for Old Colls. Stretch and Ormsby made yards then Coetzer carved up the right wing to 10m from the line, with pick and goes setting Cagi up to crash over and take the final points.
